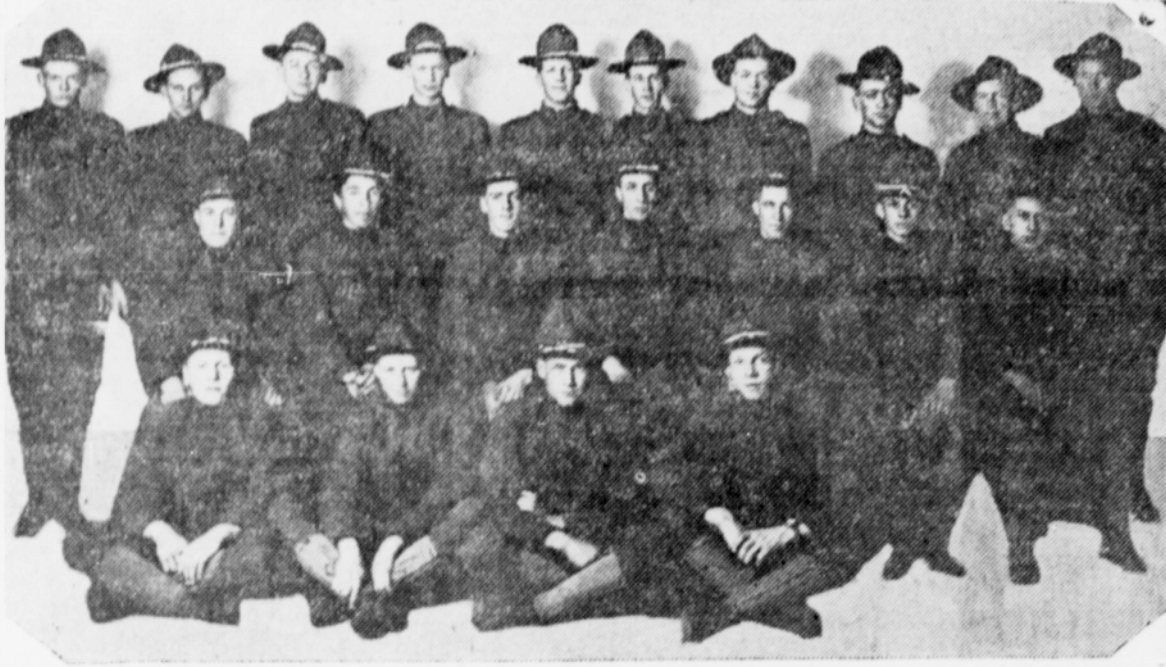

Twenty years ago this spring, during the last of March and the days which followed the declaration of war against Germany, April 6, 1917, Washington county poured its young men into the ranks of the army and navy in all branches of service. 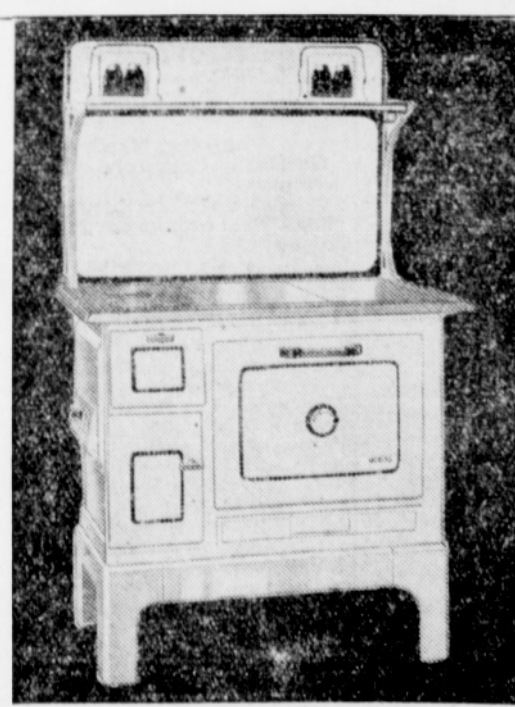

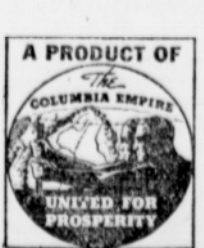

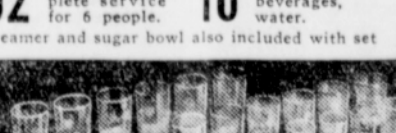
