County Softball League Formed

Washington county softball league is definitely under way following a meeting Tuesday night at which it was agreed tentatively to have a six-club league, including Cornelius, North Plains and one other team outside of Hillsboro, and the B. E. Maling, Perfection Bakery and National Guard teams of Hillsboro. The sixth team probably will be Oreno, but that point has not been definitely determined.

Next Tuesday evening representatives of all teams included in the league will meet at Clen's Place in Hillsboro and the organization will be completed and by-laws adopted. This meeting is at 8 o'clock.

Determine Season

Representatives at the meeting Tuesday agreed to a 16-week split season, making it possible to play twice around each half, with each team playing twice one week, each month. Each team is to be composed of 15 men who must be signed up at least eight days prior to the game in which they play. The eligibility lists must be given to one of the rules committees.

According to tentative agreement, the season will open May 4 at 6:15 p. m., with all games played at Hillsboro the first week to get the different teams together to promote better acquaintance, friendliness and sportsmanship. The following games will rotate to home teams where diamonds are available, and such rotation will continue at least until suitable lights are installed so night games may be played. After lights are installed, triple headers, beginning at 7:30 p. m. were agreed upon. Under the present agreement the extra game per

month will be played the fourth Friday each month.

Umpires Rotate
Each team is to furnish one umpire for each game. The umpires rotating by innings, one umpiring bases one inning and one balls and strikes, alternating each inning. Gloves may be used by all players.

The following is the result of a drawing of numbers for a schedule: 1. Cornelius; 2. North Plains; 3. B. E. Maling; 4. sixth team, to be determined later; 5. National Guard; 6. Perfection Bakery.

For the opening games teams will be paired as follows: Cornelius vs. North Plains; B. E. Maling vs. undetermined team; National Guard vs. Perfection Bakery. Due to the already keen rivalry existing between Cornelius and North Plains and between the Guard and Bakery teams, hotly-contested games are expected from the initial "play ball" on May 4.

Plan Triple-Headers

After suitable lights are installed, triple-headers will be played each Tuesday under the lights. Many fans who would not give up their regular dinner hours to enjoy softball games will then be able to witness three fast games in one evening. There will be a nominal charge, probably ten cents each, to cover the cost of lighting the field.

Washington county league is a

step towards establishing Washington county in the popular softball sport in Oregon. It will promote better and faster teams and should enable our county to pick a team that will make a creditable showing in the state tournaments this year. This sport is rapidly increasing in popularity and has gone over with a bang in many sports-minded towns and cities in Oregon.
