Altogether the bill would take from the Treasury in the years 1939, 1940, and 1941, \$50,000,000. It estimated that operation of this plan would require some \$500,000,000 of non-federal loans, plus the federal billion and \$50 -000,000 for grants in the first four years.

AVERAGE annual subsidies would run between \$100 and \$125 per unit. But an individual grant could run as high as \$175 a year on a \$5000 house, and it is estimated rent costs would be cut 40 or 45 per cent. Rents, of course, would depend on local taxes on housing projects. If there were tax exemption in practice as well as in theory, there would be a possibility of reaching the \$600 a year families who could, for example, get a maximum subsidy on a four-room, \$4000 house at rent of about \$2.50 per month
