PACIFIC UNIVERSITY, April 13—Twelve entirely new schools have already increased the enrollment of the Pacific University annual music tournament, which will be held on April 23 and 24. Defenders of titles will be Lincoln high school for Class A; Oregon City for Class B, and Corbett for Class C.

This year for the first time, the tournament will be divided into four classes and the grading will be based on quality rather than interpretation. All solo events and the string quartet will take place on Friday the 23rd and all group events will follow on Saturday. The tournament will begin promptly at 9 a.m. on both days. Class A choruses will not be scheduled until Saturday afternoon.

The chairman of the judges will be Frank T. Chapman, at one time dean of the Pacific university conservatory of music and then man largely responsible for the early growth and development of that department. Mr. Chapman was a student of the famous S. W. B. Mathews and Louis Fall and was at one time a member of the Chicago Symphony orchestra in the first violin section. Mr. Chapman will also be guest of the present student body.

The merchants of Forest Grove have again donated nine silver trophies to be awarded to the individual soloists in each field. These trophies are to be retained permanently by the winners. As has been customary all contestants will be entertained at the annual carnival sponsored by the Women's Athletic association with Miss Winifred Fortner in charge. Also the Pacific university band will entertain with an outdoor concert.
