Mrs. McIntyre and F. Wilcox Speak; Arts Exhibited

Mrs. A. C. McIntyre of Pendleton, president of the State Federation of Women's Clubs, was a guest Tuesday afternoon of the Coffee club and gave an address on the work of the federation. She urged the club to give its support to Mrs. Sadie Orr Dunbar of Portland, well known here who is a candidate for president of the National Federation of Women's Clubs.

The program was in charge of Mrs. E. J. Kortzeborn, chairman of the American Home Department, and a display of home art of early days and the present time was featured.

Program consisted of an address, "What Our Homes Should Be," by Prof. F. M. Wilcox of Laurelhurst academy, who stressed some of the serious duties of the homemaker; and musical numbers by students of the academy, directed by Mrs. Ernst, head of the department of music. The numbers included a baritone horn solo, two selections by a girls' trio, and a soprano solo.

Home arts exhibit included a piece of the charter oak in which the charter was hidden at Hartford, Conn., in 1827; a glass ash made in the first pressed glass factory west of the Rockies; a small book of hymns written in 1825, published in 1838 and bound with buckskin—Mrs. W. J. Enschede, exhibitor, Hillsboro made in 1874—Mrs. M. Ernst, Old glass—Mrs. E. Peters, Gravy tureen of the 17th century and cup and saucer of 1850, from England; also a hand-woven coverlet handed down through four generations, and another coverlet woven by a negro slave—Mrs. R. W. Cox, Original paintings, copies of House Beautiful magazine of 1903, and quilt top pieced during Civil war—Mrs. E. E. Bentley, Pen-cil drawings—Mrs. L. C. Lomax, Cross-stitch wall motto from Switzerland—Mrs. Fred Amacher.

Edging displays were of finest coffee-makers and Sunbeam iron and sprayer by Bristol's Hardware Co. New Flame-ware glass pressure cooker, and other useful kitchen articles by Lester Ireland & Co.

Another interesting display was an old wooden washing machine loaned by P. A. Anderson of the Pendleton store, contrasted by a fine new type from Ireland.
