Struck to the pavement as she was walking to the drinking fountain at the Busch Service station at Third and Baseline street Sunday afternoon about 3 o'clock, Mrs. Theresa Eischen of Cornelius, 73, was taken to the Smith hospital for treatment.

Examination there failed to reveal any broken bones, although she suffered severe body bruises. With her at the time was her granddaughter, who escaped being struck.
