Farmers Urged to Follow Rules

It is to be expected under the agricultural conservation program, for plowing down cover crops, the county committee of the Washington County Agricultural Conservation Association should be notified prior to plowing down, according to an announcement.

During March, letters to all workmen who were mailed informing them of the need and many such requests as turned up.

"Occasionally individuals who have not filed a request for a cover crop inspection indicate that they are expecting to receive such a payment," says John W. Kamma, president of the local group. "Payment will be approved only when such inspection has been made and if at the time the crop is turned under there is a substantial stand and growth."

In those instances where it is expected to carry out weed control practices, a notice of intent to do this should be filed in the county office soon which should designate the area or areas on which such control is to be carried out.

In this practice the state committee has laid down certain procedures and requirements which will be followed if payment is made. Essentially, these requirements are that the weed control operation whether it be periodic cultivation or by the use of chemicals, must be effective and accomplish some appreciable measure of weed eradication or control.
