Washington county cows again led the 14 testing associations in production, according to the last report of test summaries made from Oregon State college.
High cow for the association is "Daisy," a grade Guernsey producing 86 pounds of fat and owned by Chris Reichen. Second high cow was a purebred Holstein owned by A. W. Connell and which produced 84.6 pounds of fat. The summary shows the average production for the 8045 cows under test as 20.41.
High test herd for the county was C. W. Bamford's 10 purebred Jerseys.

Dr. R. L. Bean Joins Veterinarians Here

Dr. Robert L. Bean, graduate of the Colorado school of veterinary medicine, has joined the firm of Nicol and Alquist veterinarians in Hillsboro, and has entered on his duties.
Following his graduation from the Colorado institution, Dr. Bean was appointed by the federal government as veterinarian inspector and worked on eradication of contagious diseases in Mississippi. For the past year and a half he has been employed on federal Bang's disease work, mostly in Eastern Oregon.
In announcing his arrival here, Dr. Nicol declared that Dr. Bean came with excellent recommendations by federal officials, and also the Oregon veterinarians' examining board.
"We feel fortunate in having procured his services here," Dr. Nicol said this week. "Until Dr. Alquist is able to resume his country trips, Dr. Bean will work mostly on Bang's testing."
