### Farm Debt Group Aids Farmers Here

County farm debt adjustment committee are playing an important role in the rehabilitation of rural life by helping farmers and their creditors arrange settlement of excessive debts and in recommending adjustments which will make farm foreclosures unnecessary.

These committees are composed of members who are impartial to the suggestions of either side. The farmer's problems are analyzed and a farm plan is worked out to the satisfaction of both debtor and creditor. Oftentimes an extension of time or the refinancing of the obligation is the satisfactory solution.

Each county has a farm debt adjustment committee as well as a rehabilitation supervisor. All information is treated confidentially and the service is free. Anyone desiring information or assistance from the county committees may do so by applying to the rural rehabilitation supervisor, or by writing to "District PDA Supervisor, Resettlement Administration, Mayer building, Portland, Oregon."

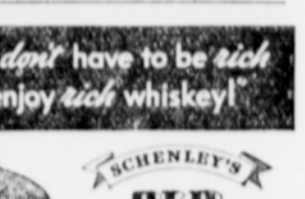
