Artillery Guns Going to Timber

First of a three-day firing practice will be held by the 218th field artillery regiment of Portland Sunday a mile north of Timber, where arrangements for a firing range have been made.

The entire regiment is expected to attend the practice, in which the artillerymen will practice with sub-caliber ammunition in preparation for the army maneuvers to be held this summer at Fort Lewis, Wash.

Sec 2d period of the training will be Sunday and Monday, May 2 and 3 at the same place, it is reported. At that time all artillery reserve officers will be present.

If plans carry, the regiment, with its guns, will pass through Hillsboro about 8:30 a. m. Sunday morning. The train will include the trucks and guns, which are mounted on pneumatic tires.

School Districts to Share Funds

School districts of the county will share May 1, in the half-year distribution of \$26,637.62 of the elementary school funds. The distribution is at the rate of \$28.30 cents per teacher on a basis of 27 pupils average daily attendance, according to O. B. Kraus, superintendent of schools.

The payment, Kraus points out, will reflect a downward trend which has become apparent in recent years, showing a steady decrease since the peak of 1929 when it stood at \$175.95. The fund is derived from a two-mill levy which has been adversely affected by decreased valuations.

Hillsboro public schools, will receive a payment of \$2437.70 and Forest Grove will receive \$1924.30. Beaverton receives \$1154.70, Tigard \$898.10 and Aloha-Huber \$769.90.
