Potatoes Poor Crop

While potatoes have on the hill soil in the past been one of our profitable crops, the past few years they have not been so good and the fact that they are a late crop dug in October or November means that the farmer has no opportunity to get a crop seeded on the ground after the potatoes are off in time to establish itself sufficiently to hold the soil if conditions are favorable for erosion.

Infested Land Follow

Most all land annually devoted to summer fallow in this county is land infested with Canada thistle or wild morning glory. While this acreage of crop land so infested is almost negligible as compared to the total, the increase in the number of fields that are infested would seem to indicate that unless there is more general effort to control and eradicate the acreage, which would have to be followed annually for purposes of weed control, would increase tremendously. This makes it desirable to place more emphasis locally on that phase of the conservation program.
