This, says Bauman, is all the more remarkable because of the fact that the company equipment must pass over all kinds of roads and meet all manner of conditions. The vehicles have traveled approximately 13 million miles in that time. During the past 14 years only 42 accidents have been reported, and of these only nine have been what might be termed major accidents, the balance being of a very minor nature.

have shown no particular interest in the development project.  
Stricklin, in his talk Thursday night, pointed out to the meeting that the county court was not empowered to do other than lend assistance to the association.

Owners Must Move  
"Whatever move is made," Stricklin told the assembly, "lies within yourselves. You alone have the power to proceed with the setup for an improvement."

Estimates of cost, or exact plans of what is to be accomplished, are not now available, but it is expected that these details will be rushed.

With several hundred thousand dollars of government money for flood control on the Willamette and its tributaries pending in congress, property owners along the Tualatin river have not yet made any move to benefit by the proposed work.

Attempts Made  
Several attempts in the past to form drainage districts, have failed because many of the residents along the river did not feel that the work would be of special benefit to them.

Differing from the drainage district, the improvement district formed Thursday night does not depend on a 100 per cent co-operation, it is pointed out. Under this setup, wherever a property owner wishes to remain out of the association, the work jumps his property and proceeds on the other side, thus leaving the land owner without his improvement.
