

Rites Held for John E. Bennett Scholls Church

Funeral services were held Tuesday afternoon from the Scholls Methodist church for John Eric Bennett, 76, resident of Scholls since 1909. He died Saturday. Burial was in Mountside cemetery near Scholls, with Masonic rites conducted by Sherwood lodge.

For a number of years Bennett was a deputy county assessor, working through the eastern part of the county, and was also in the county tax department for a time. He retired from this work last year because of his health.

He was born April 18, 1861, at Boonesboro, Iowa, a small village of seven log houses and ten families, where he spent his boyhood. He attended Drake university at Des Moines, Iowa. He was a pioneer of North Dakota, going there in the year of 1882.

Bennett was united in marriage to Minnie Marie White of New Rockford, N. D. in 1890. To this union were born eight children. Two sons, Clarence Erle and Jay E. Bennett, preceded their father in death. Survivors are the widow, Mrs. Minnie M. Bennett; three daughters, Olive Schulz of Bethany, Mary Welsh of Fairview, Bessie M. Hoeffel of Witch Hazel; three sons, Max W. Bennett of Fairview, George F. Bennett of Oakland, Cal., and Stanleigh H. Bennett of Portland, and one brother, George E. Bennett of Boone, Iowa.

He was a past eminent commander of Zion Commandery No. 9, Knights Templar, and past worshipful master of Century lodge, A. F. & A. M. of New Rockford, N. D., and was affiliated with Oregon Commandery No. 1 and Hawthorne lodge, A. F. & A. M. of Portland.

Funeral arrangements were in care of Pegg's chapel, Beaverton.

Award Appealed

An appeal from a decision of the state industrial accident commission was begun in circuit court this week by C. D. Robinson, who alleges that he was injured October 6, 1936, when a roof over the donkey engine he was operating collapsed, injuring his neck and spine and causing concussion of the brain resulting in hemorrhage of the brain, affecting the right eye and causing a 20 per cent loss of sight.
