Steps toward a flood control program in this county were taken Wednesday at the meeting of Pomona Grange in Buxton. A committee, including Dan Burkhalter, W. A. Root and John Schmelzert was appointed to meet with a similar committee from the Farmers' Union and the county court.

The second most popular cheese in these United States if popularity is to be measured in production, is Swiss cheese. The eyes in Swiss cheese are what determine its grade and hence its price, for to a large extent they indicate the flavor. They should be neither too large nor too small, uniform in size and appearance, and evenly distributed.

Cream cheese comes third in American production. Genuine cream cheese is made from a rich cream thickened by souring or by the addition of rennet.

And brick cheese fourth. Where it got the name nobody knows. It is made from the whole milk and has a strong, sweetish flavor about half way between the Limburg and Swiss cheeses. It has many small round eyes, quite different from those of Swiss cheese. Its texture is elastic.

Serve a cheese dish and balance the meal with bread, a vegetable such as tomatoes, lettuce or spinach, and fruit as the dessert.

### Cheese Souffle

4 tablespoons butter  
4 tablespoons flour  
1½ cups milk  
1 teaspoon salt  
½-lb. sharp cheese, grated  
6 eggs, separated.

Melt butter, blend in flour and add milk and salt. Cook until sauce is thickened, stirring constantly; then add cheese and stir vigorously until melted. Remove from stove and add to beaten egg yolks, blending thoroughly. Cool. Beat egg whites until stiff and fold lightly into the cheese sauce. Turn into large buttered casserole and bake one hour in a slow oven. Yield: Five generous servings.
