**Out on Strike**

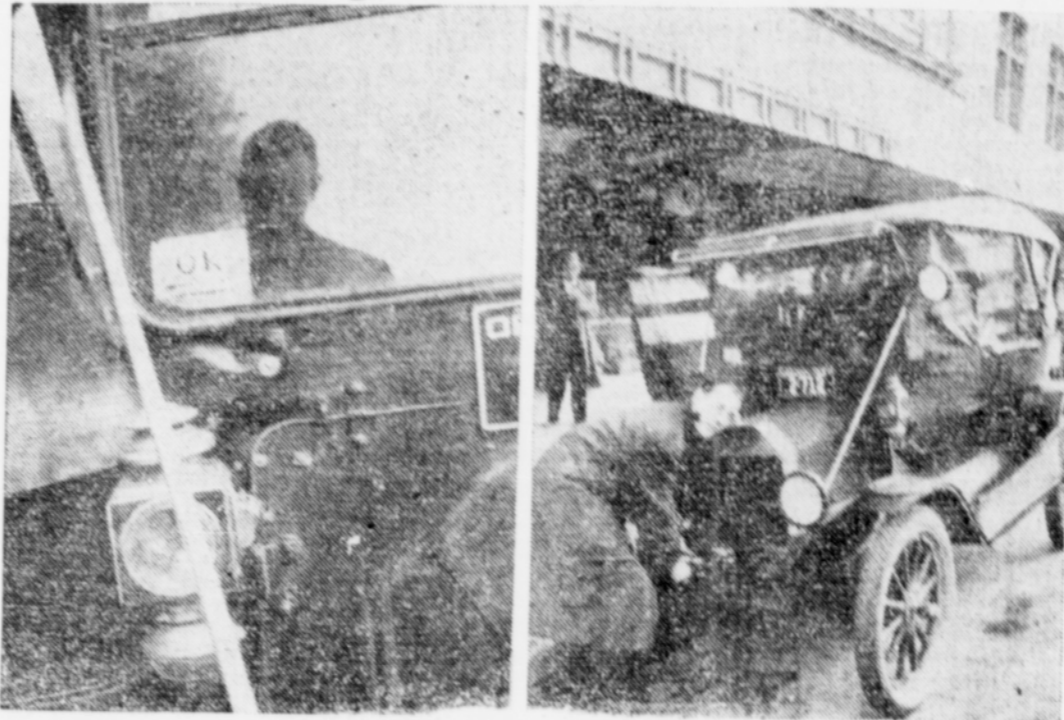
Only a few of the loggers in this community are working, most of them being employed at camps now down on account of the strike.

There's something besides bees buzzing about Hillsboro. Down under the surface of things, all winter long, there has been the stirring of something struggling toward the spring sunshine.

Apparently that something is industrial organization in this stand, old city of Hillsboro, where for years upon years neighbors have worked for neighbors, the devil took the lazy man, and the pay has been what seemed fair between neighbor and neighbor.

**Unrest Grows**

Out of the east, up from San Francisco, and across the hills from Portland, has crept an unrest among the laboring people and a desire for organization.

Everywhere those who labor gather, it is the talk of unionism.

Employers here deny worry, and many a person, unacquainted with what is underway, laughs at the thought that workmen are discussing unions. There are even those who declare that unionism never can gain a foothold here—that the workmen are not interested in such a movement.

**Charter Issued**

Yet a charter was issued here Friday night at a meeting held in the Veterans of Foreign Wars hall, to a union local involving workers in the B. E. Maling, Inc., cannery. The charter was delivered by Gust Anderson of Portland, secretary of the Central Labor council.

The union is to be, it is said, under the supervision of the American Federation of Labor.

Truck drivers everywhere seem now to be wearing union buttons, and a move is said to be underway to organize the store clerks in Hillsboro, while the warehousemen are working on employing Hillsboro industries where warehousing is carried on.

**More on Way**

Cooks and waitresses, and bartenders seem on the way to stretching their organization, from Portland into the valley to include the smaller centers, and there are some rumors that attempts will be made this summer to bring agricultural workers in the county under the sway of unionism.

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### Rural Program in Second Year Here

sary for the average family for one year.

For each person, Mrs. Hawver, home management supervisor, recommends an average of 30 quarts of tomatoes, 50 quarts of vegetables, 50 quarts of fruit, 15 quarts of canned meat and fish and 15 pounds of dried or pickled meat and fish be stored, in addition to root vegetables in bins. The total of 130 quarts should be multiplied by the number of persons in the family. Average for the state is five persons in rural families.

**Protects Health**

This suggested quota protects the health, and provides for all but emergency food needs for 10 months. An adequate supply of home-produced food gives better security to the farm family than money in the bank, as it guards against failure of income, or rise in food prices, it is pointed out. Most low-income farm families need to double or triple their usual amounts of stored food, so their cash income can be spent for other purposes.

All families are keeping farm and home records not only of expenses and income, but also of the value of farm produce provided for the family living. This makes a complete progress report and emphasizes benefits derived through the rehabilitation program.
