

Pioneer Woman Dies; Burial on Saturday

CHEHALEM MOUNTAIN—Funeral services for Mrs. Clara Wohlshlegel, 80, were held at Newberg Saturday afternoon. Interment was in Mountside cemetery.

Clara Wohlshlegel was born at Bethel February 16, 1857, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Joseph McGuire, who crossed the plains in 1852, coming from Wisconsin. She was reared by her mother's parents, Mr. and Mrs. Moore, near Salem. She was married to William Wohlshlegel at McMinnville January 4, 1877. To this union were born 13 children. Three died the same winter during an epidemic of diphtheria many years ago.

Mr. and Mrs. Wohlshlegel and family moved from Helvetia in 1890 and settled on Chehalis mountain, south of Scholls, where Mr. Wohlshlegel died December 13, 1904.

After selling her farm Mrs. Wohlshlegel lived near or with a daughter, Mrs. L. T. Finigan, until the latter died March 12, 1934. Since then she had lived with another daughter, Mrs. L. I. Hulit, at whose home in Newberg she died April 29, after a lingering illness.

Mrs. Wohlshlegel was a member of the Methodist church at Newberg.

She is survived by seven sons, John and Harry of Portland, Will,

Ernest, Carl, Fred and Ed, all living on Chehalis Mountain, and one daughter, Mrs. Hulit; three brothers, Grant McGuire of Portland, Homer McGuire of Chesaw, Wash., and Charles McGuire of Spokane, Wash.; eighteen grandchildren and ten great-grandchildren.

Service Held for John Thomas Rice

Funeral services were held Sunday afternoon from the Forest Grove Undertaking company chapel for John Thomas Rice, 72, resident of Forest Grove for 47 years. He died Wednesday in Forest Grove hospital after an illness of six days. Burial was in Hillsboro cemetery.

Rice was born December 9, 1864, in Kossuth, Iowa, and came to Oregon in 1890. January 9, 1907, he was married to Ella Green in Newberg. Two children were born to this union, Elsie Rice and Mrs. Lida Jezek, both of Portland. Besides the widow and daughters, two sisters, Mrs. Harriet J. Cheadle and Mrs. F. C. Taylor, and a brother, W. A. Rice, all of Forest Grove, survive.

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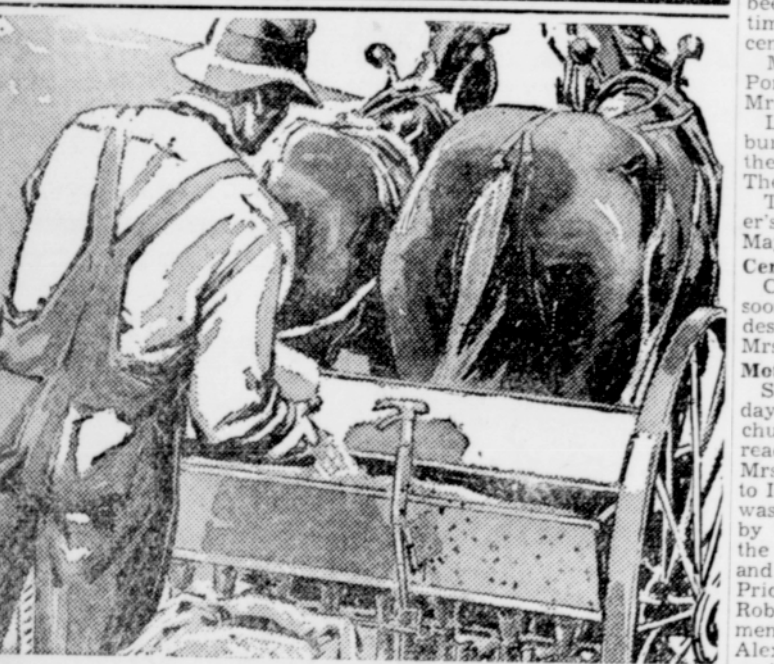
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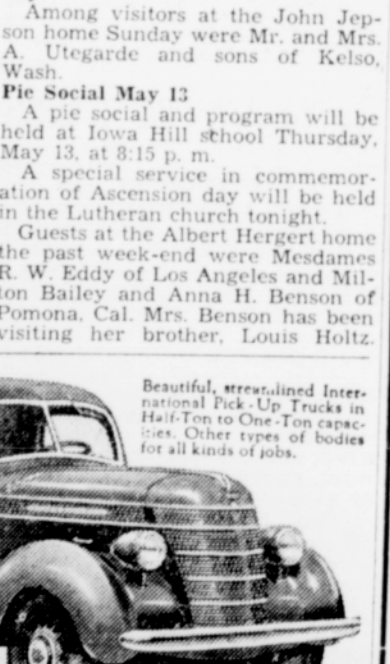
Mrs. F. Cruzen Dies; Rites in Portland
