 discussed in a preliminary attempt to arouse interest in opening creek and river channels to allow water to drain away during the winter.
 A committee already is appointed to confer with a similar Grange committee and the county court.

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Warm Days Aid Spittle Bugs

Warm weather the past few days has brought out spittle bugs more numerously than they have appeared heretofore this season. This means that, if control measures are to be effective, in most instances dusting should be done immediately. Some strawberry plantings are beginning to show a heavy infestation, says County Agent W. F. Cyrus.
 From now on to harvest these bugs will grow rapidly, and because of their damaging affect to plants losses on yields to the berry grower amounting to as much as one-third or one-half will occur, judging by experiences in former years.
 Dusts carrying one-half of one per cent rotenone are effective. Some materials have been placed on the market carrying a smaller percentage of rotenone than one-half of one per cent, but to date this is the strength that should be used. Lime should never be mixed with any rotenone dust.
 Ordinarily the quantity required

per acre will be about 60 to 75 pounds. In addition to rotenone, quicklime has been used in some cases, but if it is used, care should be used in application. "The only cases of injury I have noted," says County Agent Cyrus, "have been where the applications have been put on improperly, applying the dust in a heavy stream so that it 'piled up' on the plants." Generally rotenone should be used until more information is available, although it costs more.
 Throwing a film of dust over the outside of the leaves will not accomplish any appreciable control. The insects must be hit with the dust. As they are found mostly on the under side of the leaves, in

the fruit buds, and down in the new leaves starting from the crown, it is necessary that some kind of a duster be used which puffs the dust underneath the foliage.
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
