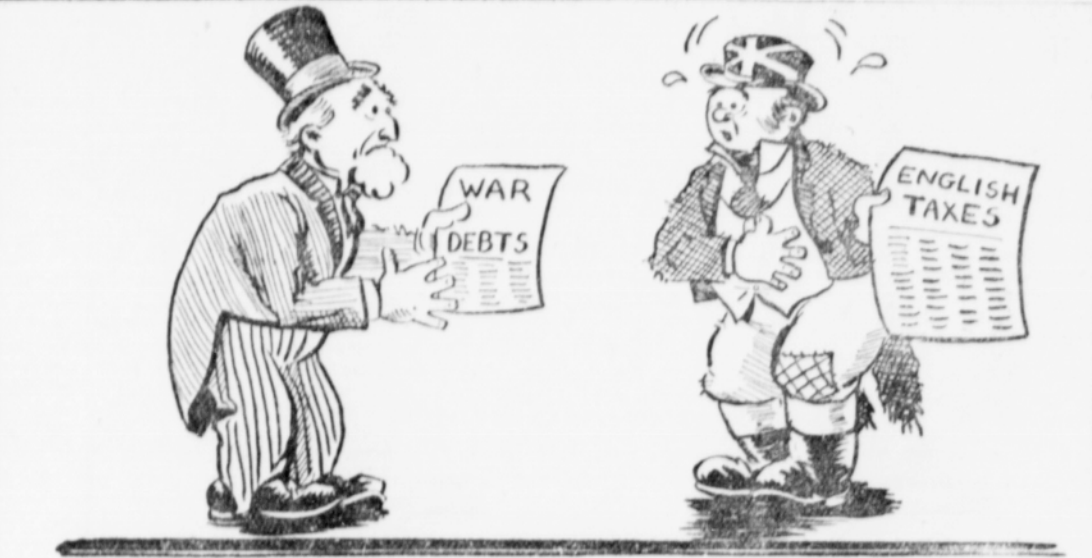

**Fatigue Comes to Car Drivers**  
Take special precautions if you drive while you are tired, advises the Oregon State Motor association. Although laws have been passed limiting the number of hours of continuous driving for commercial vehicle operators, it is unfortunately impossible to place a legal restriction upon the driving capacity of any particular individual, the motor association comments. A fatigued driver is a menace not only to himself, but to everyone near him on a highway, the motor association traffic safety examiners point out. No statistics are available, but it is declared true that thousands of accidents have been caused by drivers being tired or actually asleep at the wheel. Fatigue is not only caused by driving too long without rest, but that dangerous "tired feeling" or actual sleep may suddenly engulf the driver for a number of other reasons, safety experts explain.
