## Williams' Purebred Jersey Leads County Testing Group

With 798 cows in the Washington county testing association under test in March, Mrs. Tom Williams' purebred Jersey, "Bluebell," was high in the county, producing 1776 pounds of milk and 85.2 pounds of fat.

The C. H. Bamford herd of 10 purebred Jerseys was high in this class, averaging 644 pounds of milk and 42.18 pounds of fat. High for herds of more than 20 cows was the herd of purebred and grade Jerseys owned by C. H. Buchanan Jr. with an average of 703 pounds of milk and 38.28 pounds of fat.

Two herds in the 12 to 20-cow class were tied for first place. They were the herd owned by Mrs. C. Robertson and Son, purebred Jerseys, with an average of 698 pounds of milk and 40.2 pounds of fat, and the Mrs. Williams' herd of the same breed and class with 682 pounds of milk and the same amount of fat.
