depression of 1932 he continued to operate his mills and logging camps and to give employment to the largest number of men employed by anyone in the county. From a small beginning he gradually extended his holdings along the Tualatin river until Hollybrook farm, which he caused to be constructed upon marshes and wooded areas, became one of the best farms in Washington county.
