Write from African Station

Rev. and Mrs. Paul Lehrer wrote to his father and mother about the missionary station in Africa where they are stationed. The letter is dated March 10. Rev. Lehrer is a former resident of this section, having lived here several years when he was a boy during the time his father, Rev. Emil Lehrer, was pastor of the local Evangelical and Reformed churches. Rev. Paul Lehrer is a brother of Mrs. Ernest Staus of this section. Among the interesting things they write about the station and surrounding country is the following information: "The mission station is located three miles from Kijabe, which is a railway station, and also has a post office and several Indian shops. Nairobi is a larger town and is 48 miles from the station. The white population is about 2,000 to say nothing of the colored. They have a Woolworth store there. The country near the missionary station is very hilly. There is no river near or any body of water except some steam jets, which send forth hot water. The sunsets and sunrises and also the moonlight are beautiful there. They do not have malaria fever because of the high altitude. There are no flies nor mosquitoes, so do not need screens. They do not have snow as it is not cold enough. The coldest months there are June, July and August, and they call it winter. The native huts are made of grass and sticks. The mission owns a large tract of land and some of it is used for garden. They raise many kinds of vegetables such as celery, onions, tomatoes, beets, cabbage, etc. Among the various activities of Rev. Lehrer are preaching and teaching and he attends a native language class. Mrs. Lehrer is also occupied by various duties at the station. There are 18 missionaries at this station. The nearest mission is the Church Missionary society.


