These several grades indicates that if the lower grade is because of sweet clover seed and not noxious weeds, then it may produce just as good a crop as a higher priced grade. Sometimes there is very little difference in the price of these three grades of seed.

In spite of the good results that may be obtained, the blue tag seed is, of course, first choice, and the lower grades should be considered only upon the specific characteristics of the particular lot.

These plots prove again the wisdom of insisting on certified Grimm seed. While various other strains may be more or less widely publicized in certain sections, yet the one variety that has proved itself consistently in Washington county is Grimm. Without exception the certified grade of seed is desirable, because certification is the one insurance the farmer or purchaser has as to its truthness to name, strain, and origin.

Fifteen-minute check at Second and Oak street, one of the most dangerous intersections in the city because of the shrubbery which masks the corners, disclosed five persons stopping, three using a sliding stop and four passing without passing.
