Schools Close Year of Gains; Activities Many

Hillsboro grade schools closed Friday with a total enrollment for the year of 623 as compared to 563 the previous year, making an increase of 63 pupils, or an 11.3 per cent gain. Average attendance for May was 525.7 as compared to 475.3 in last month of the previous year, showing an increase of 50.2 and a gain of 10.6 per cent.

Of the school year just closed, C. H. Nosler, superintendent, said this week: "Besides following the regular state course of study, the following are a part of the year's work. Each of the schools has given a number of programs as a climax to health work, special projects and other educational work as well as a number of entertainments. Each class in the junior high presented one program as an auditorium period.

"Our basket ball and softball teams took more than their share of contests last year, and the county pennant at the spring field meet but our aim is not so much to produce winners, but to develop good sportsmanship and strong healthy bodies. Miss Barbara Potts and Wesley Clausen carried on a physical program also, whereby each child had two periods weekly for physical training. The eighth grade also had half a year in first aid work.

"The seventh and eighth grade girls took sewing for an 80-minute period each week. As a result many of them are making their own garments. At the same periods the boys of the same grades were given manual training led by Walter Henry.

"We had about 160 4-H club members in our grade school during the past year, every other meeting being on school time. The large number of classes with completion of work was made possible by the splendid co-operation of unselfish and public spirited leaders and parents.

"Miss Fisher gave part of her time to art, and art appreciation in the first five grades, and the remaining time to music in all grades twice a week. She also coaches a girls' chorus in junior high of about 30 voices.

"We have a band of 30 pieces, members ranging from fourth to eighth grades inclusive, led by F. E. Bushnell. The band appeared regularly in our uniforms and played for the chamber of commerce. We were especially proud when they won the Hill Military pennant for the best band in class 'B'.

"Visiting day marks the close of each half year's work. At this time in all the years of transporting pupils no child has been injured.
