Await Bonneville

Oponous councilmen were of the opinion that a franchise should be given PEP until Bonneville rates were determined and the public allowed to learn the advantages of distributing power to itself.

Easter, speaking for his company, made a personal plea for the franchise, reminding the councilmen that he had been engaged in Hillsboro for 24 years in the development of the present distribution system, and that he had given every possible service.

He declared that the mortgage trust bonds used in financing his company extended no improvement, and proposed that money could not be expected in extensions and improvements where a proper franchise had not been granted.

Franchise Valuable

For that reason he said, the franchise was very valuable to his company as well as valuable because of a showing of good will in the territory where the company is operating. He outlined immediate expenditures of \$10,000 for improvements.

"Our company," Easter related, "is like a farm horse in the field. If it is hampered and ill by lack of proper treatment, the work will only half be done."

As Easter brought his plea to a close, Dr. Robb declared that this did not seem to be the time to renew a franchise, at least not a long one, in view of the development at Bonneville.
