Rev. Putnam, pastor of the Christian church, is in charge of the school. Mrs. Duffield is in charge of the singing. Other people are assisting in this school.

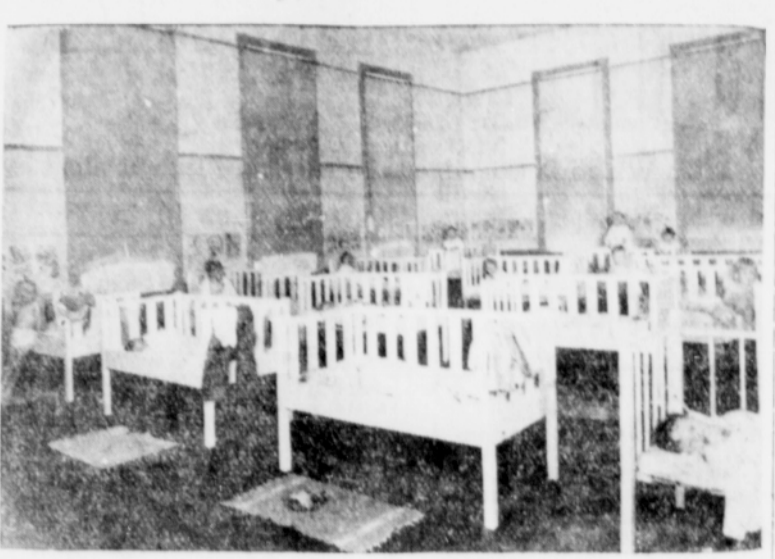
Miss Theresa Curran and her mother, Mrs. King of La Grande, visited Father Costello and Miss Nora Costello during the last of the week.
