William Johnson is the man credited with constructing the first house in Portland and with starting the first store, Wilkes relates.

result from an accumulation of creosote in the flue. A periodic cleaning will prevent such fires and save home owners many anxious moments.

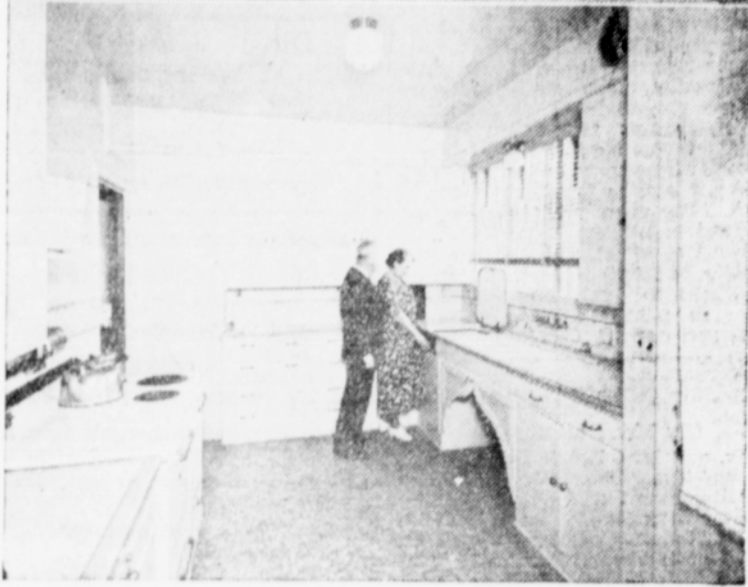
In reporting such a fire to the department, always state that it is a chimney fire. One or two men can easily extinguish the fire. It is not necessary to call out the whole fire department.

Be sure to state your reason for the sale.

Be sure to state the correct location of your farm, giving the most direct route from nearby towns.

Be sure to state the time of your sale. If you have a large sale, get your auctioneer's advice on whether you should start your sale at 10 o'clock and give a free lunch at noon. Lots of hot coffee, sandwiches, etc. don't cost much and will pay for themselves many times over in more active bidding, and in getting your sale through before dark.

In listing your stock, tell breed or strain; age, weight, color, T. B. test, milk test, and other good points; your machines should be listed as new, nearly new, or in good shape, etc.

There will be much less chance of error or "leave-outs" if your copy for your ad is written on only one side of the sheet.

Bring your copy in as early as possible, as early copy gets the better location in the paper.
