

Salem Attorney Speaker Here Farm Union

Herman Laffky was speaker Saturday night before the Farmers Union and explained the plan and object of the Farmers' Crop Protective Cooperative. There were 100 farmers present and a number joined the association. Other speakers were Homer Smith of Marion county, and Walter Orr, vice-president of the Washington county unit.

"The aims and objects of this association," Laffky said, "will be to create a co-operative collective bargaining agency to effectively represent the interests of its members which will be farmers and producers of agricultural products in general, in any and all harvesting, transporting, storing or marketing, or in any and all emergencies arising which may interfere or jeopardize the harvesting, transporting, storing or marketing of any of the said products."

Will Elect Officers

Officers and executives or agents thereof will be elected to represent, primarily and exclusively, the interests of its members to the end that any and all emergencies such as strikes, or other avoidable adjusted, and all operations necessary in normal harvesting, transporting or marketing may continue uninterrupted pending arbitration or settlement."

Arrangements for the annual Farm Union picnic, which will be held July 18, are in the hands of the committee including R. G. Scott, Mrs. Fulton of Middleton, Mrs. Julia Christensen, Mrs. William Hergert of Laurel, and Leonard Leipholz.

Business Sections Threat

Your life is most in danger when you are driving or walking through your community's well-paved and marked business section in Oregon, according to the Oregon State Motor association. Despite equally smooth pavement and safety guides, residential districts are not far behind in killings. The state's worst roads—rural "cowpaths" and bumpy link roads—are the safest.

HEARTY SALADS
The first balmy days of spring stimulate an appetite for salads. Somehow, a salad along with a few golden daffodils, manages to bring a bit of spring sunshine to the dining room table.

Whether or not the salad tempts

the appetite depends entirely upon how attractively it is gotten together. If the greens are served crisp and cold . . . if the salad is not served up too early and allowed

to stand, but brought directly from the ice box to the table, you have the salad at its best. Even though it may require more haste in the serving, the results warrant it.

Serve a hearty salad with some form of hot bread and a hot drink, preferably hot chocolate, and you have a simple but at the same time a well-balanced and inviting meal. A hearty salad, however, must include among other things, some highly concentrated food, such as macaroni, bananas, or cheese, or even whipped cream. Otherwise the family will become much too hungry before the next meal rolls around.

In planning a combination salad, consider including a generous serving of cottage cheese at one side of the lettuce leaf and top it off with a French Dressing. Cottage cheese, you know, offers an excellent substitute for meat. If it's a fruit salad you have in mind, plan to include small balls of a cream cheese and this time use a fruit dressing combined with whipped cream. Don't forget the bananas, and you have a salad hearty enough to suit the appetite of the busy man, but dainty enough to call forth exclamations of delight when the women meet for bridge.

Below you find a recipe for a fruit dressing that is simply made and delicious served with any fruit salad.

Golden Salad Dressing

$\frac{1}{4}$ cup pineapple juice

$\frac{1}{4}$ cup lemon juice
 $\frac{1}{4}$ cup orange juice
2 eggs
 $\frac{1}{2}$ cup sugar
 $\frac{1}{2}$ cup whipped cream
Heat juices, beat eggs until light. Add sugar in hot juices and cook like boiled custard. Remove from fire, cool, and add whipped cream.


Cottage Cheese Ring with Fruit Filled Center

1 tablespoon gelatine
 $\frac{1}{4}$ cup cold water
 $\frac{1}{2}$ cups cottage cheese
 $\frac{1}{4}$ teaspoon salt
 $\frac{1}{4}$ cup cream
1 head lettuce
 $\frac{1}{2}$ cup pineapple
6 dates
1 orange
1 cup strawberries or bananas.

Soak the gelatine in cold water and dissolve over hot water. Put cheese through a sieve. Add seasonings, cream and gelatine. Turn in-

to border or ring mold. When firm unmold ring on lettuce and fill center with fruit. Serve with Golden Salad Dressing or whipped cream.
