

Salem Attorney Speaker Here Farm Union

Herman Lafky was speaker Saturday night before the Washington county unit Farmers' Union and explained the plan and objects of the Farmers' Crop Protective Co-operative. There were 100 farmers present and a number joined the association. Other speakers were Homer Smith of Marion county, and Walter Orr, vice-president of the Washington county unit.

The aims and objects of this association, Lafky said, "will be to create a co-operative collective bargaining agency to effectively represent the interests of its members which will be farmers and producers of agricultural products in general, in any and all harvest, just transporting or marketing, or in any and all emergencies arising which may interfere or jeopardize the harvesting, transportation, storing or marketing of any of the said products."

Will Elect Officers
Officers and executives or agents thereof will be elected to represent, primarily and exclusively, the interests of its members to the end that any and all emergencies such as strikes, or other avoidable emergencies may be amicably adjusted, and all operations necessary in normal harvesting, transporting or marketing may continue uninterrupted pending arbitration or settlement.

Arrangements for the annual Farm Union picnic which will be held July 18, are in the hands of the committee including R. G. Scott, Mrs. Fulton of Middleton, Mrs. Julius Christensen, Mrs. William Hergert of Laurel, and Leonard Leipsch.

Lights Flood Field
System of lighting used here places four poles on each side of the field with large reflectors containing three lights each mounted on the top. Under reflectors flood the field from side to side while the corner lights are directed to cover the ends and length of the field.

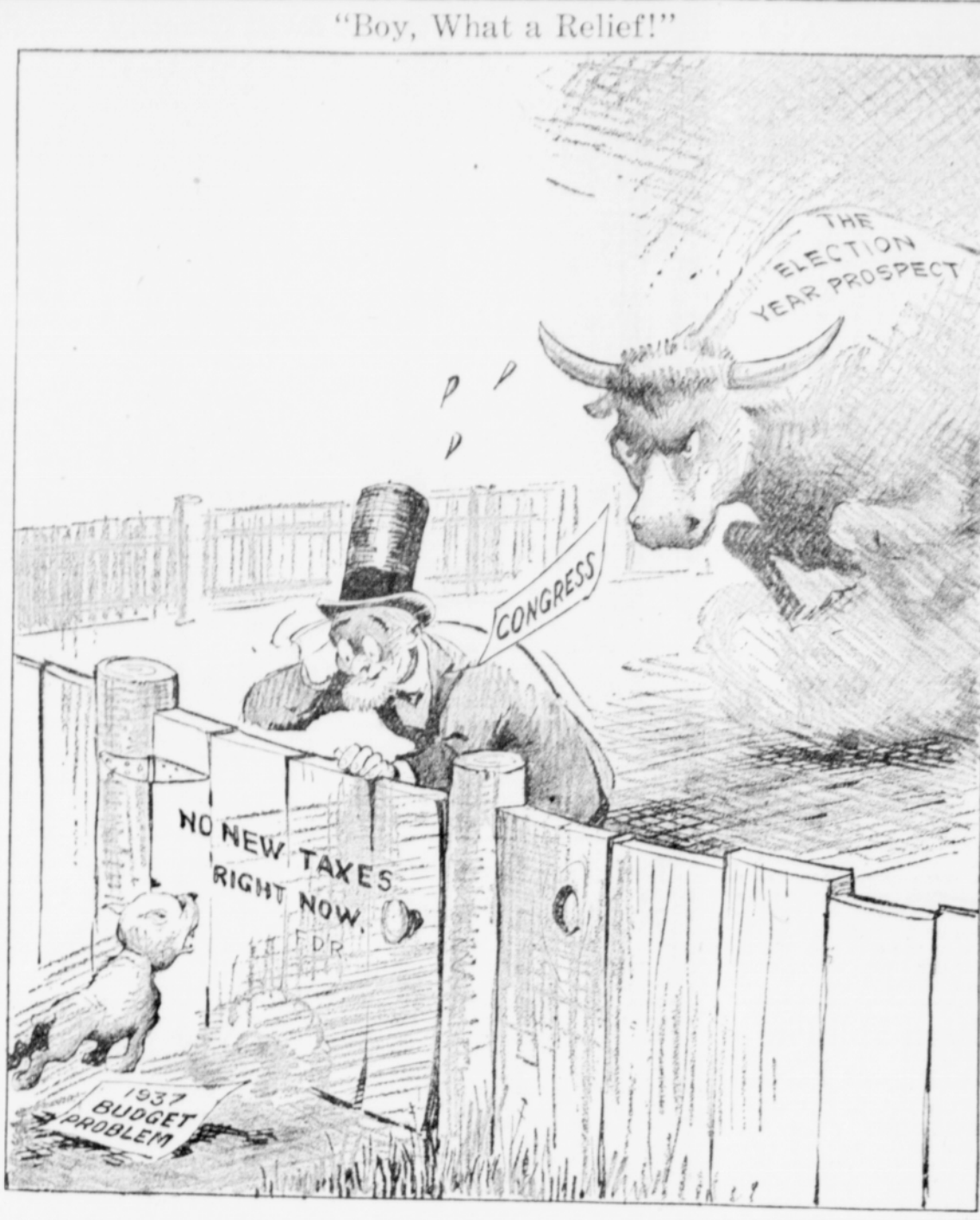

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to stand, but brought directly from the ice box to the table, you have the salad at its best. Even though it may require more haste in the serving, the results warrant it.

Serve a hearty salad with some form of hot bread and a hot drink, preferably hot chocolate, and you have a simple but at the same time a well-balanced and inviting meal. A hearty salad, however, must include among other things, some highly concentrated food, such as macaroni, bananas, or cheese, or even whipped cream.
