

Molasses Aids Legume Silage

Molasses added to legume silage will improve its quality, according to the experience of a few Washington county farmers, who have used it. This is also borne out by experimental data from various places in the United States, says County Agent W. F. Cyrus. W. T. Putnam & Sons, Farmington, have added this material in connection with silage made from pea refuse from the cannery. They have also put up this silage without molasses and found the quality not so good as when molasses was used.

Nearly every year some alfalfa goes into the silo that otherwise might not be utilized because of weather damage. Proper fermentation of material for silage requires sugar, and legumes crops contain a relatively low amount of sugar. Some Washington county farmers have put alfalfa in the silo without the adidtion of anything else, and some have added grain hay or to supply necessary sugar.
