Chester Morgan of Goldson visited his father, C. A. Morgan, recently. Miss Frances Fickas accompanied him home for a visit.

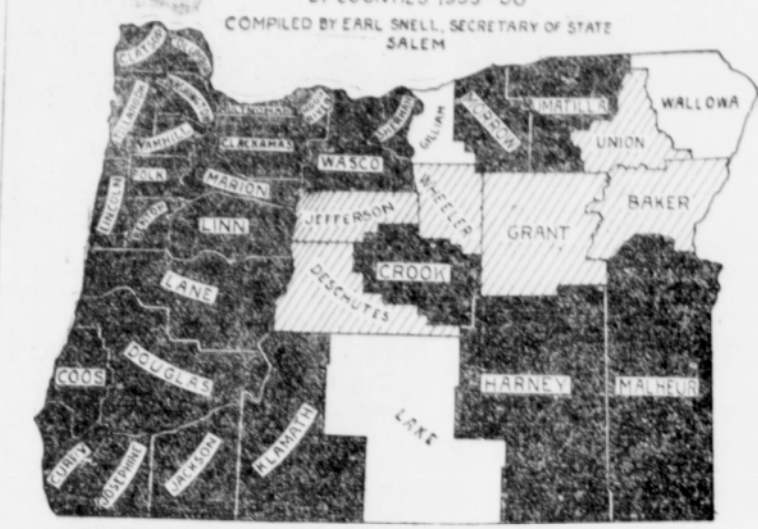

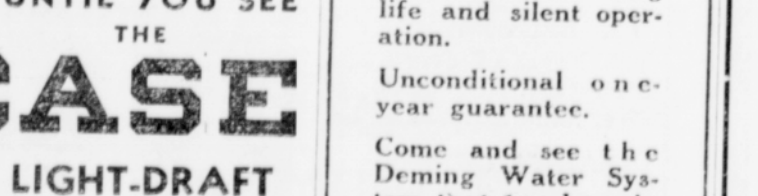

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Molasses Aids Legume Silage

Molasses added to legume silage will improve its quality, according to the experience of a few Washington county farmers, who have used it. This is also borne out by experimental data from various places in the United States, says County Agent W. F. Cyrus W. T. Putnam & Sons, Farmington, have added this material in connection with silage made from pea refuse from the cannery.

Nearly every year some alfalfa goes into the silo that otherwise might not be utilized because of weather damage. Proper fermentation of material for silage requires sugar, and legumes crops contain a relatively low amount of sugar. Some Washington county farmers have put alfalfa in the silo without the addition of anything else, but some have added grain hay or straw to supply necessary sugar.

Amount of molasses will vary according to material. D. D. Hill, of farm crops department, Oregon State college, reports tests indicate that for ordinary legumes produced in the Willamette valley, an addition of from 30 to 50 pounds of molasses to one ton of silage material would probably be sufficient to cause a normal fermentation in the silo.
