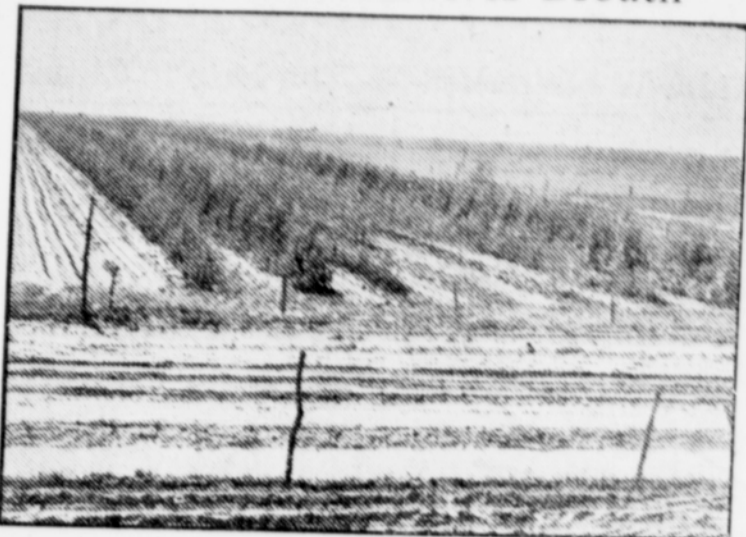
Reports on State Meet

Shelter Belt Survives Drouth



Surviving two of the most severe drouths in record, a portion of the experimental "Shelter Belt" planted by the government three years ago is shown here, in Greer county, near Mangum, Okla. On the average 550 of these trees out of every 740 planted in 1935 survived. The shelter belt, extending from Oklahoma to the Dakotas, it is hoped, will retard surface drainage and act as wind-breaks in the dust area. Ample rain so far this spring is raising hopes that the project will succeed.
