Health Meeting Monday Night

All persons interested in the use made of Christmas seal money and betterment of health conditions throughout the county, are urged to attend the public meeting Monday at 8 p. m. in the county court room, Orange Phelps, newly elected president of the Washington County Public Health association, announced this week.

The meeting is open to all interested in what becomes of this portion of the budget, and promotion of child and adult health. It is for the purpose of concentrating the efforts of every such individual so that real progress can be made.

By means of this and similar meetings open to all, it is proposed to acquaint taxpayers and others with what the health department is doing and why and to find out the health needs of all sections and to stimulate interest in healthier living conditions.

More definitely it is the wish of the county public health department, according to Dr. D. C. McDonald, that every community from Gaston to Helvetia and Buxton to Tualatin should have a group of local persons who will take active interest in health at all times, and who will in times of emergencies be ready to help intelligently.

This will greatly enlarge the present association which for the past six years has been active in such endeavors as sponsoring tuberculosis skin tests for school children; distributing health literature and loan closet supplies, and providing films and speakers and other aids to organizations conducting health meetings.

among the other batteries of the regiment.

History of the regiment takes it back to the World War days when Batteries A and B of Portland were a part of the 147th field artillery, serving in France. On return to Portland, the 148th field artillery of light guns was formed with the first battalion in Portland.

Later the batteries of the first battalion were transferred to the 218th field artillery and another battalion recruited. With federal recognition for Battery E here, and Battery F in Newberg last week, the regiment is complete.

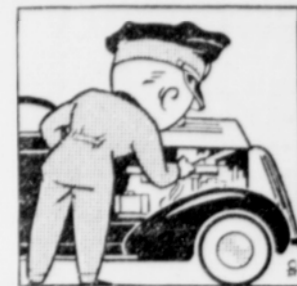
Veterans Serving

Among the regimental officers are a number of men who served with Battery A and B in France, including Col. Jackson, Major Dufur and Major Ward. Scattered throughout the first and second battalion in Portland are a number of other men who are officers with war service.

Both Col. Hurst and Col. Jackson expressed themselves as well pleased with the armory setup in Hillsboro, pointing out that few of the smaller cities possessed such drill floors, quarters for officers, men and equipment as Hillsboro.

Recruiting for the new unit was virtually completed Saturday when a gun section from battery D, Portland, with one of the large guns and a truck, spent nearly all day on Main street, where action of the gun was explained. The detail was commanded by Captain Martin W. Jones and Lt. Marvin L. Rogers.
