Disease Levies Big School Toll

School children in Hillsboro public and high schools lost 10,048 school days through illnesses of various kinds from October 22, 1936, to May 28, the report made by Dorothy K. Weinstein, school nurse, shows. Of this total there were 6039 days lost in the grade school as compared to 4018 in Hills.

Illness included chickenpox, measles, pneumonia, scarlet fever, trench mouth, whooping cough, pinkeye, impetigo, ringworm, itch and flu. Whooping cough, impetigo, itch and flu led the list of communicable diseases, while flu and pinkeye were most severe in the high school. The report shows 181 children suffering from communicable disease in the high school, and 122 in the grade school, making a total of 303.

There were 208 grade school children vaccinated for small pox, and 170 in the high school, while 333 were tested for tuberculosis in the grades, and 277 in Hills. The school nurse made 373 home visits for the grade school and 141 for the high school.

Of her work, Miss Weinstein said in her report: "In general the pupils learned to know the nurse as someone who was there to help them and as the months went by more and more came voluntarily for advice

and care so they could practice good personal and public health.

"Many mothers sought advice and help regarding improving home menus so they would be adequate. This was especially true with families of small income. Child training suggestions were indicated numerous times, and if the mother was interested, the nurse tried to help with this.
