County Health Group Meets

Crowding the county court room in Hillsboro Monday night, more than 60 enthusiastic members of the Washington County Public Health association assembled in the first county-wide meeting since the election of Orange Phelps, Hillsboro, president.

The meeting was called to discuss organization, and Mrs. Sadie Orr-Dunbar, Portland, executive secretary of the Oregon Tuberculosis association, related methods for formation of county health groups, and work of the various committees.

Twelve or more community districts are to be organized in the county, Phelps declared. Some of these organizations already are under formation, and work in others will begin soon. Meetings will be called in districts to consider organization plans.

Each community, when organized, will have a complete set of officers, and committees, and will carry on active health campaigns.

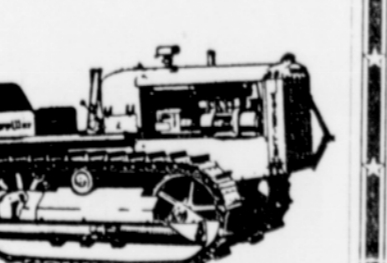

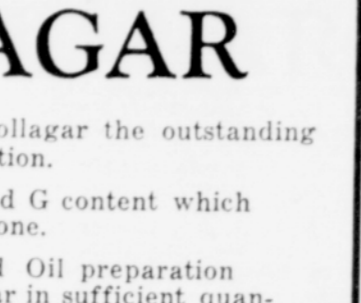

Rodent Control Meet Planned

Plans for a rodent control demonstration at the Roy Antrim place, Aloha, Thursday, July 8, at 7:15 p. m., have been made by members of the Aloha Grange, reports L. E. Francis, assistant county agent.

Method for trapping and poisoning gophers, trapping moles, poisoning ground squirrels and field mice, and methods for the control of other miscellaneous rodents will be demonstrated and discussed. The present trend of increasing plantings of alfalfa and clover have made rodent control a very important measure, states Francis, because rodents are particularly damaging to such crops, and especially so when these crops are under irrigation.
