lished for many years. Through his newspaper work, he took an active interest in historical lore of the state, developing a wide knowledge of early day history. He was one of the organizers of the National Educational association and was the only survivor of 37 charter members of this nationwide organization. He was elected president at the Buffalo convention in 1901.

Mr. Tozier was also connected with the Hillsboro Independent in its early days.

With his sister, Mrs. Weathered, the couple became the first curators of Champoux state park, and are credited with centering wide attention on this pioneer memorial. During his work there, with the aid of his sister, he acquired what is considered one of the most extensive collections of Oregon pioneer and historical items in the state.

After leaving Champoux, Tozier presented his collection in Washington county, and it is now housed in the court house. On bringing this to Hillsboro, Mr. Tozier said he wanted it to be here when he died, as this had always been considered his home. The collection is especially good on Washington county history.

Carnival, free acts and music by the Bethany band will complete the day.

Drawn into high gear early Monday morning for the closing day of the celebration, there is a long list of interesting events climaxed with the usual fireworks display after dark, with a larger and more brilliant display than last year.

Big Parade Monday

Monday's festivities begin at 9 a. m. with the forming of the big parade sponsored by the Rotary club on First and Main streets downtown for the march to the park which will be concluded at 10 o'clock in time for the flag raising ceremonies to be conducted by members of Sea Scout Ship Rainbow. The scouts will raise and lower the flag each day of the celebration with appropriate ceremonies.

Following the exercises in the auditorium will be the free acts on the midway and at 12:30 p. m. Verboort and Gaston baseball teams will meet in the park. Both teams are at the top in their league. The rodeo will follow the baseball at 2:30.

Many Bands Play

The rodeo will complete the afternoon events with the free acts scheduled again at 7 p. m., followed by the fireworks at 9:30.

Besides playing and marching in the parade, bands from Hillsboro, Sherwood, Forest Grove, Helvetia and Bethany will play all day in the park.

Patriotic exercises are under the joint sponsorship of the V. F. W. and American Legion with a committee including A. J. Foelker, chairman, Fred Engeldinger, Arthur Kroeger, Fred Corn, E. W. Plapp and L. E. Furrow, in charge.

Wilbur Dillon of the Firemen's Association is manager of the celebration with Andy Lentz, S. W. Melhuish, Bill Everett, Glen Burge and A. L. Prock as members of his committee directly in charge.
