Carpenters Offered Civil Service Test

United States civil service commission has announced open competitive examinations for positions of senior cabinetmaker, senior carpenter, senior electrician, and senior painter, for appointment in Washington, D. C., and immediate vicinity.

These examinations are open to all citizens who meet the requirements. The entrance salary is \$1,860 a year. Applicants must have had at least one year of journeyman experience in the trade for which application is made, subsequent to the completion of a four-year apprenticeship therein, or four years practical experience in the trade applied for, the substantial equivalent of such completed apprenticeship.
