

County Legion Junior Baseball Team in District Play-Off at Dallas Friday

Close Contest Won Thursday by Junior Team

Hillsboro American Legion junior baseball team will play Dallas at 4 p. m. Friday at Dallas in the first game of the district play-offs, according to a schedule arranged at Salem Wednesday night by representatives of the various teams. Hillsboro was represented by Carl Russell, Dr. Ralph Dresser and S. E. Fayman.

Other district games scheduled were as follows: Woodburn vs. Hillsboro at Woodburn, Sunday, July 11, 1:30 p. m.; Woodburn vs. Dallas at Dallas, Tuesday, July 13, 4 p. m.; Dallas vs. Hillsboro at Hillsboro, Thursday, July 15, 4 p. m. and Woodburn vs. Hillsboro at Hillsboro, Saturday, July 17, 4 p. m. In case of a tie it will be played off Monday, July 19.

"All last week we were building another camp," he writes. "Every morning and night we walked six miles, four by road and two by trail. It sure was tough walking that six miles some after eight hours of strenuous labor. We saw two deer on the trail one morning and one another morning. An elk came right down in camp one evening. It didn't seem scared at all. We got within 10 yards of it.

"One of the boys saw a grizzly bear up on the ridge where we were working. The other night a bear was in camp and tried to break in the meat house. The fish are starting to bite in the river and a boy caught 30 yesterday."
