Mabel Uchi against Safeway Stores Inc. in which she alleges personal injuries when she stepped into a pipe trap alleged to have been left open in the floor. She is asking \$299. The fall is alleged to have been January 30 of this year.

Cecil Pease, charged with larceny of livestock and malicious and wanton injury to personal property, plead guilty and was sentenced by Judge R. Frank Peters to three months in jail. He stole a pig from Mrs. Cheney Benefiel of Manning and took her horse at midnight to ride to Banks for a drink.

Postponed sentence was given Everett Donovan, Madeline Donovan and Fred C. Lorenzen, Portland, when they pleaded guilty to stealing railway iron from the Southern Pacific at Timber. They were arrested April 27. They must report each month.

Pleading guilty to passing bad checks at the Earl Bateman store at Glenwood, Jack Hembree won a postponed sentence on condition that he make the checks good and report each month.

Pleas Not Guilty

Time for trial of John Pullen will be set later, following his plea of not guilty to theft of a bicycle owned by Guy Weisenback of Aloha. Pullen is alleged to have taken the bicycle on three different occasions, the last time the same day he was released from jail on a previous charge.

Zoe Witt, Marie Rogers and Sherman Douglas, indicted for chicken theft, were given until Friday to enter a plea. The women were released on bail.

Grand jury, which went into session Thursday, completed its Friday noon with the return of six indictments.

Three negroes, Marie Rogers, Sherman Douglas and Zoe Witt were held for trial on charges of stealing chickens from the pens of C. H. Mayfield in Beaverton. The same indictment names Jane Doe, a fourth party alleged present, but who escaped.

Donald LaValle, 60, itinerant, was held on a morals charge. LaValle was arrested in Portland after he fled from near Banks in company with a minor Japanese girl.

Rene Ardell and Bessie Larison were indicted for an alleged violation of the moral laws. All persons indicted are held in jail or are on bail.
