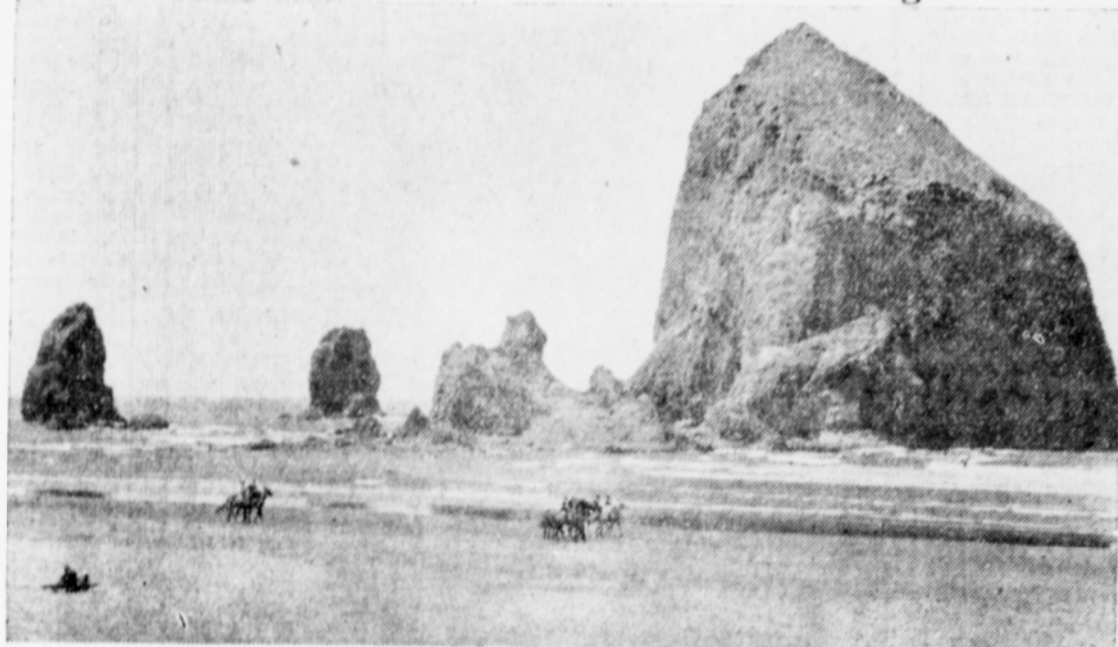

Justice for All Urged by Pastor

"Tyranny of a labor union is just as much in opposition to the real American spirit as is the tyranny of the capitalist," declared Pastor Henry S. Haller, preaching in the chapel of Pilgrim House in celebration of Independence day, last Sunday morning. "The Liberty Bell" was Pastor Haller's sermon topic, with the Scriptural text, "Where the Spirit of the Lord Is, There Is Liberty."
The Pilgrim minister pleaded for justice not only for the working man of the unions, but for the owners of industrial plants as well, and especially for the great middle class who are in danger of being crushed between the quarreling of the two groups.
"Loving one's neighbor," insisted Mr. Haller, "is a practical commandment for today, to be heeded by both capitalist and labor leader."
