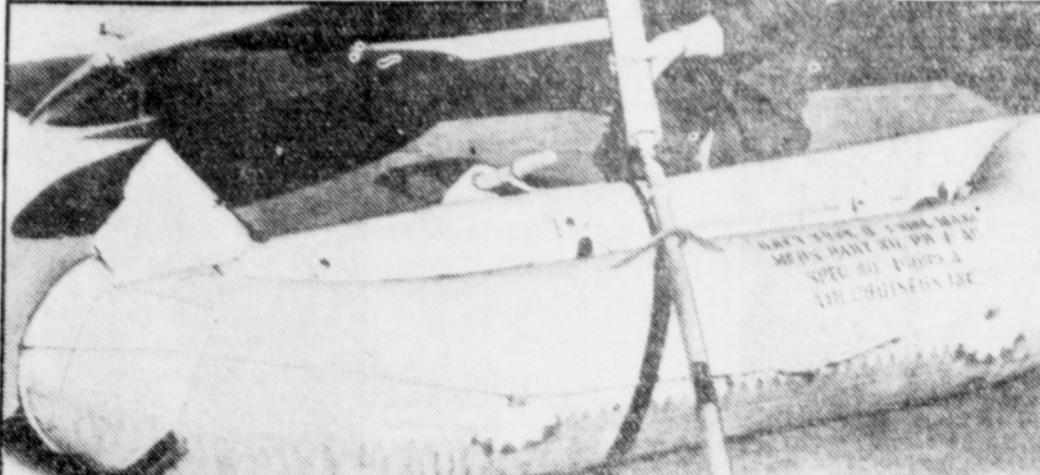
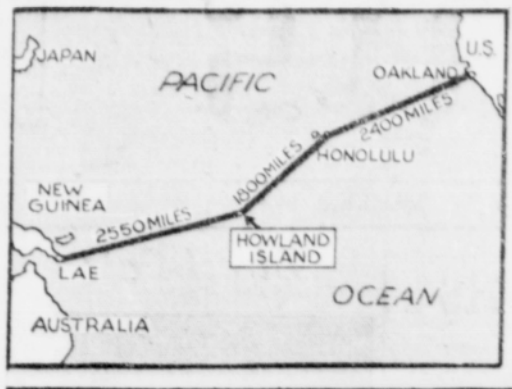

Inflated with a small hand-pump, this tiny rubber lifeboat was part of the emergency equipment carried by Amelia Earhart on her round-the-world flight which ended in the Pacific ocean near Howland Island.

The famed aviatrix is shown in the above photo as she demonstrated how the boat was pumped up, before she took off from Oakland, Calif., on the first stage of her journey.

Food Stores Accept Union Agreements (Continued from page 1) agreement with the local, and other counties in this part of Oregon are being organized as rapidly as contacts can be made.

Under the agreement, apprentices will receive \$17.50 for all those with less than six months' experience. From six months to a year, the minimum is \$20 per week; a year to two years' experience places the minimum at \$22.50, and for all persons over two years' experience, the minimum is \$25.

Where four or more are employed, one must be designated as head clerk at a minimum wage of \$27.50. Time and a half must be paid for all time over 34 hours per week, or nine hours per day.

Sunday Closing Sunday closing and uniform working hours are to be set up by a committee from the participating grocery stores. In all cases the agreement guarantees a closed shop. All employees are allowed a week of vacation with pay where they have been employed for a year or more.
