Mrs. Burkhalter Tells of Places Visited on Trip

Glad to get back to Oregon, Mr. and Mrs. Dan Burkhalter, George Burkhalter, and Mr. Burkhalter's sister, Mrs. Rose Crouch of Portland, returned last week from a five weeks' trip to the east, where they visited relatives in Indiana, Ohio, and Illinois. Mrs. Burkhalter tells of their trip as follows:

"We motored through twelve states: Oregon, Idaho, Utah, Wyoming, Nebraska, Iowa, Illinois, Indiana, Ohio, Missouri, Kansas and Colorado, traveling 7000 miles. We were in the house where Dan and his sister were born. They had not visited the place for 38 years, but very few changes had been made in that time.

"Among the many interesting places we visited was Forest park in St. Louis, Mo., which covers 4000 acres, and contained a bird and animal from every part of the globe; an out-door opera with a natural stage setting. Two large oak trees at the entrance of the stage are insured for \$5000 each against electric storms in the park.

"We also visited the Thomas Jefferson memorial, one large room of which is filled with trophies presented to Lindbergh from all over the world. One of the most interesting things was a set of silverware consisting of 187 pieces. We spent one day in Chicago and took a 30-mile trip through the principal part of the city. There we visited the Elks Memorial building, which cost \$3,000,000. Different kinds of wood and marble from all over the world were used in the building.

"Went to the Kentucky line in the flood district, where we saw some logs and limbs still hanging in the cross-arms of telephone poles.

"On our homeward trip we visited Yellowstone park, and words cannot explain the beautiful scenery in the park. We encountered all kinds of weather on the trip—wind, rain, snow, electric storms, tornadoes, and dust storms. We did not miss anything through western Kansas and Eastern Colorado, and drove 20 miles over grasshoppers.

"We did not see an Oregon paper nor any news from Oregon in papers in the east, and how glad we were to get back into old Oregon, the best state in the union. Coming home through Portland and vicinity, the roses looked more beautiful than ever."

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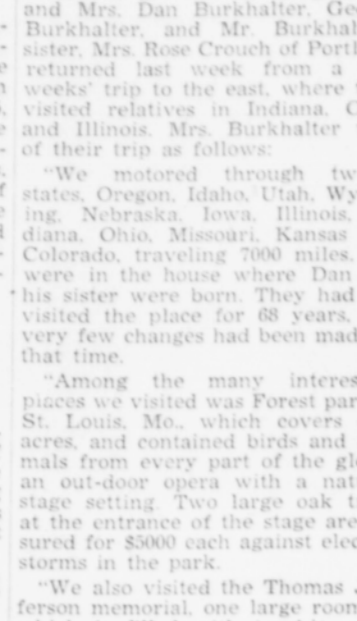
