

Manna Trophy Planned Again County Fair

The Carnation Calf Manna contest will again be a feature of the Washington county fair. This is the fourth year that the large silver and gold Calf Manna trophy will be awarded by the Carnation Milk company to the highest scoring dairy club participating in the activities of the county fair.

The basis for scoring the clubs are: First, percentage of club exhibiting; second, exhibit placings; third, showmanship placings; fourth, judging contest placings; fifth, demonstration team placings; sixth, herdsmanship; and seventh, fitting.

The Calf Manna trophy has aroused a lot of keen, competitive interest among the dairy clubs of the county and has played an important part in the building up of a strong 4-H dairy show at the county fair.

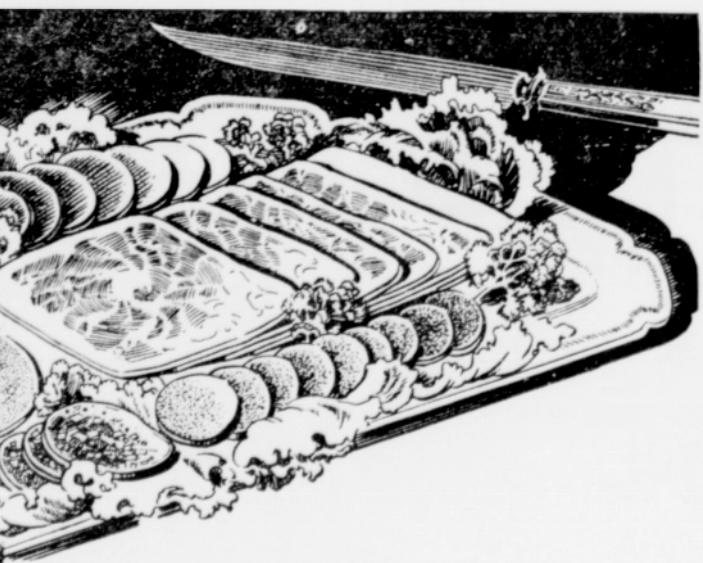

Whip the cream until stiff, combine lightly with the mayonnaise. Fold the cheese mixture into the whipped cream. Place in the freezing tray of a mechanical refrigerator for several hours, or pack in equal parts of ice and salt for four hours. Serve on crisp lettuce and garnish with additional mayonnaise combined with whipped cream. Serves eight to ten.
