Legion Juniors Win and Lose; Here Saturday

Showing form which may carry Hillsboro Legion Juniors to a district championship, the local team last week won from Dallas 6-2 and last Sunday to Woodburn in a tight game 2-1.

Two of the local hitters were absent from the lineup Sunday when Jansen, center fielder and pitcher, and Kemper, right fielder, were absent to play with the Woodburn nine. In the return game here Saturday afternoon at 2:30 both will be back in Hillsboro uniforms.

Battery for Hillsboro was Love and Kerkman. In the nine innings Love held Woodburn to six hits and struck out five men. The Woodburn hurler allowed seven hits and struck out seven.

The locals bunched their hits in the last three innings, with LaPorte driving out a two bagger, Schlegel and Kerkman both managed a hit in that inning. LaPorte allowed himself to be caught off base, voting an almost certain score. Sawnow and Love both managed hits in the seventh.

Woodburn hits were all scattered, with Hillsboro playing a bang-up game from the start, giving excellent support to Love at all times. On the field the boys made a distinct impression in their new uniforms.

Hillsboro lineup included Taylor, 1b; LaPorte, c; Schlegel, 3b; Kerkman, c; Steele, cf; Sawnow, rf; Bishop, 2b, and Love in the box.

Hillsboro now faces two games with the third in prospect. Thursday afternoon, they meet Dallas here, with the big game Saturday afternoon. If they win from Woodburn, then a third game with Woodburn will be played Monday afternoon on grounds to be selected. Possibly this playoff might be in Hillsboro. The Dallas game is at 4:30 p. m.

Battling through to win 6-2 over the Dallas Legion Junior team, champions of Polk county, Hillsboro's Legion Juniors scored their second victory of the season at Dallas Friday afternoon. The first game was with Postoffice Pharmacy Juniors of Portland resulting in a 4-3 win the week before.

Hillsboro made 8 hits while the Dallas youngsters were held to four. Bob Heinrich, with Kerkman behind the bat, pitched the first five innings, holding Dallas to three hits. While Miller, Forest Grove, pitched the last four innings with Ketcham on the receiving end. Miller allowed one hit, but walked three in the seventh inning to allow Dallas to score the first time. He allowed one hit in the ninth on which Dallas scored a second run.

Hillsboro scored three times on three hits in the second inning, once in the third; once in the fifth, and again in the seventh.

The team rapidly has been developing into one of the snappiest in this part of the state under the sponsorship of a joint Legion and businessmen's committee headed by Ed L. Moore. The boys, now supplied with new uniforms complete, make an excellent showing on the field.

Taught big league baseball, the team has developed into a hard hitting aggregation, with the ability to take advantage of every slip made by their opponents.

Financing has been through Hillsboro businessmen, and Hillsboro, Banks, Forest Grove and probably other legion posts in the county. The boys are selected from every section of the county and brought to Hillsboro for practice by members of the Legion and others interested.

Young Welshman Leaps Into Heavyweight Title Scene as Louis' First Opponent

A YOUNG Welshman who had found successive employment as a coal-miner, bellhop, and waiter, took stock one day of his bulging muscles, rugged physique, and general all-round good health, and decided forthwith that such menial tasks were not for him.

So young Tommy Farr became a box-fighter, a heavyweight box-fighter at that, and it wasn't long before young Tommy had established himself therein as one of King George's leading subjects in all England, Ireland, and the Dominions beyond the seas.

A comparative unknown just a few months ago, Farr first made an impression upon cauliflower alley last March when he won the British championship from Ben Ford of South Africa. But it was not until he whacked the daylight out of former champion Max Baer and scored a three-round knockout over Walter Nousek, Germany's number two ring warrior, that the big-wigs of the fight game realized the 23-year-old British heavyweight had something.

Although Farr's workmanlike triumphs over Baer and Nousek speak for themselves, there's nothing like a good foreign challenger to put additional appeal into a heavyweight title bout, and no one is quicker to take advantage of this than Mike Jacobs, who holds the contract for Joe Louis' services for some time to come.

FARR, therefore, finds himself smack in the center of the heavyweight title scene, tentatively selected to be Champion Joe Louis' first opponent either late this summer or early next fall. All of which will give John Bull's current sensation his first crack at some real sugar.

And just who is Tommy Farr? He was born 23 years ago at Pennerig, in the Rhondda Valley, mining region of South Wales. Swinging a pick at the pit face underground as a youth, Farr laid the foundation for a rugged physical development. Today he stands an even six feet, and weighs slightly over 200 pounds.

Subsequent careers as a bellhop and waiter in a Cardiff hotel didn't exactly appeal to him and about five years ago he put on a pair of boxing gloves, with full intentions of making his

livelihood within the ring. His intentions were good but his early efforts hardly stamped him as a heavyweight of any great prospect. He won decisions over Tommy Loughran and Bob Olin in very lack-luster contests and was headed for nowhere in particular until he got his chance against Ben Ford. Acquisition of the British title gave him something of a name however, even though British fighters have failed to cut more of a figure in heavyweight ranks, and then he was matched with Joe Baer. He received \$10,000 for

plastering Playboy Maxie all over a London ring, top earnings for him until then, and added further to his laurels and bank account when he kayoed Nousek a little later.

A fair boxer and capable of doing a lot of damage with a solid right hand punch, Farr appears to be a welcome addition to the sadly thinning ranks of heavyweight contenders. At least the British think so. And so does Mike Jacobs, who hopes to pack the fans into Yankee Stadium the week of Sept. 13, when Joe Louis first defends his title.
