The Hagg boys say that they will install a \$600 ventilating system as soon as they can.

Four forkfuls will take the largest load two horses can draw. Feed is ground by gas power and shot down a chute into a truck below.

A large gymnasium provides recreation on stormy days to the givers of health and strength. A double row of lunch counters is a prominent feature of this star-eyed beauties think the Hagg farm a wonderful world. There are 64 Jerseys in the herd, 56 of which at present are milked.

### Coast Road Crews Near Each Other

winter travel, according to Stephen. When this is done, the equipment will take up the task of widening right-of-way and concentrating on completion of all possible roadway from the east to the summit and beyond.

Hundreds of hours of gigantic labor still lie ahead, and tremendous sums for equipment and labor still must be spent before this super highway to the sea can carry the traffic load which awaits its opening.

Everywhere, as you climb to the summit, deep canyons gouged in the mountainside, must be filled, culverts installed, and excavations sloped to the fineness of a grain of eyebrow. Engineers have decreed that there shall be no sharp curves, and the grade shall be within a five per cent limit, thus increasing the task.

**Three Tunnel Sites**  
Three tunnel sites were in view Tuesday morning. The first about halfway to the summit, the other cut under the steepness of the last climb at the summit, and a third to carry the road through a jutting basalt cliff, and onto the easier slope of the river canyon from where the roadway drops on a five per cent grade toward McNamer's camp, and the main stream of the Wilson river.

Statistic totals to this week, disclose that the federal government, through WPA, has spent \$509,631 in wages and \$126,290 for equipment and supplies, while the sponsors, the

state, Washington, Tillamook and Multnomah counties, have spent \$148,814 for their contribution for material and equipment, making the total cost to date, \$784,735.

Balanced against the expense are 11 1/2 miles of passable road with nearly three miles of completed highway, since the beginning March 16, 1936. There have been 189 acres of land cleared and 71 acres grubbed; 235,660 cubic yards of common dirt moved, and 74,639 cubic yards of hard rock. For crossings, 5839 lineal feet of culvert have been laid, and 9469 cubic yards of rock have been placed on the road for surfacing.

**Change Channel**  
In developing the highway along the valley floor for the takeoff into the mountains, four major channel changes have been made in Gales Creek. At present there are 368 men employed on the Glenwood sector, including truck drivers. All totals are for the Glenwood sector.

All work, at present, is designed toward keeping the project in full operation during the winter months.
