Newly elected commander was one of the charter members of the post and was adjutant in 1936.



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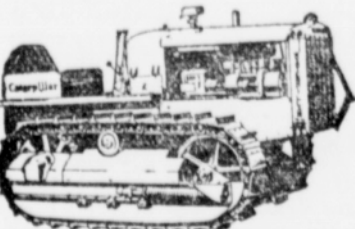
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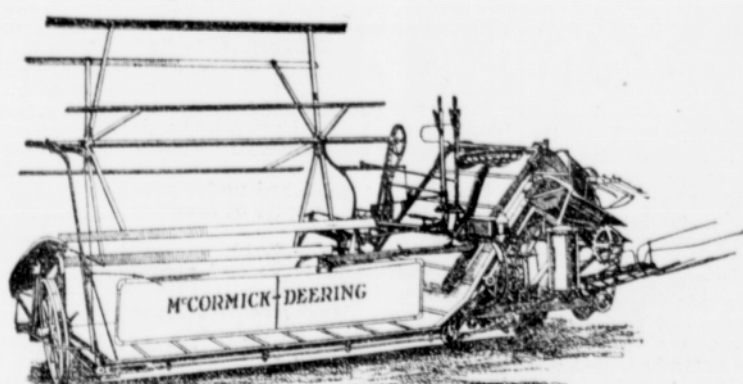
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
