U. S. Taxed Least Says Local Woman

"One thing I want to bring home to people of the United States," said Mrs. C. E. Wells, who represented the Pacific Northwest at the Pan-Pacific Women's Biennial conference at Vancouver, B. C., "is that we are taxation the least and have the most, particularly in good roads." She came to this conclusion after hearing reports from different countries, and especially Canada.

Mrs. Wells said that business seemed much better here than in British Columbia, and that Vancouver was also having its labor troubles. A strike was on at one of the big restaurants, and many pickets were on duty, forcibly preventing people from going into the eating place.

Hawaii, Philippine Islands, Korea, Japan, China, India, Australia, New Zealand, Canada, and the United States were represented at the conference, with Mrs. Gauntlet of China, president of the Pan-American conference, presiding. Theme of the meeting was "Peace," and many good talks were heard on this subject by some of the most able women of the world. Representatives from foreign countries were women who had received their education in the United States or England, and had returned to their own countries to educate their people. "A very inspirational meeting," reports Mrs. Wells.

The British government entertained the women at a banquet Friday night in true British style, and on Saturday an international tea was given, with 30 tables with food of different nations, served by girls of that nation in native costume. Guests could go from one table to another and sample the various foods. Thirty-nine nationalities were represented at the tea.

Mrs. Wells was accompanied to Vancouver by Martha Randall, captain of the women's division of the Portland police department; Mrs. G. L. Bouland, chairman of international relations of Oregon Federation of Women's clubs; and Mrs. W. F. Hartmann.
