Eleanor and Melvin Finegan of Hillsboro spent the week-end with their grandparents, Mr. and Mrs. Joseph Finegan.

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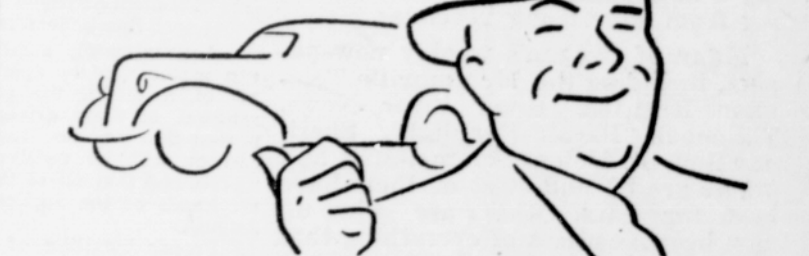
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
