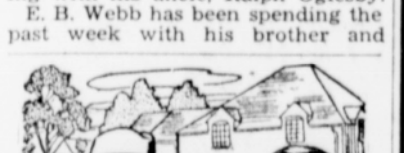

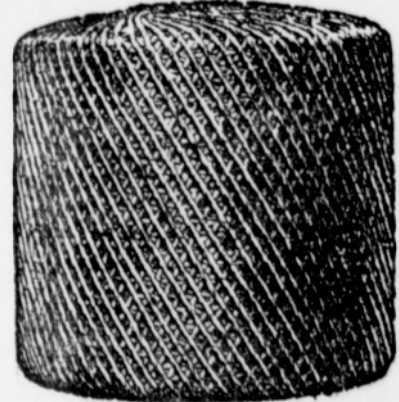
Write About Trip
