

Auto Driver Safety Pledges Available Here

Oregon motorists safety pledges now are available in Hillsboro through a supply received this week by the Hillsboro Argus. Motorists desiring to carry the pledges attached to their windshields or rear windows, may obtain the same by personal application.

"I will drive carefully at all times, keeping hands on wheel, eyes on road, mind on driving. I will respect and obey the safety rules."

Striving to stem the flux of traffic disaster scouring Oregon, thus will every motorist in the state be given an opportunity to ally himself with Oregon's crusade against death.

The motorist's "White Cross Safety Pledge" bearing the signature of the car's operator, is contained on a small red, white and blue sticker to be attached in the lower right-hand corner of the windshield. It will signify the driver's sincere intention to drive safely.

The pledge is sponsored by the Oregon State Motor association and other safety leaders as a part of the traffic safety program of education, engineering and enforcement.

Motorists will be asked to sign the pledge only with the understanding that they will accept, as the pledge outlines, their clear-cut duty to conserve life and prevent suffering and injury with every means in their power, the safety leaders aver.

Three out of five fatal vehicular accidents are caused by some negligence of the man behind the wheel, the motor association points out. To motorists desiring to lend their support in the battle against this needless toll, the pledge will be available throughout the state at offices of the motor club. Here it can be obtained at the office of the Argus, newspaper, the Chamber of Commerce, and any of the official appointment of the Oregon State Motor association.

The support of every owner registering his car with the secretary of state will be requested. Through the co-operation of James H. Cassell, president of the Oregon Automobile Dealers, purchasers of new or used cars will be given a chance to take the pledge of safe driving.

(Continued from page 1) made and an agreement reached, we are ready to resume operations."

The mill was closed when pickets from Glenwood local of the A. F. of L. placed pickets around the mill. Since that time, Smith alleges, the Glenwood local has affiliated with the C. I. O., while the Stimson employees joined the A. F. of L. organization and formed the Gaston local. Smith intimidated a Salem that threats had been made against members of the Gaston organization should an attempt be made to open the mill.

Smith denounced the recent Federation of Woodworkers' convention in Tacoma for affiliating with the C. I. O. and branded the John Lewis organization as "communistic." He charged that only 16,000 woodworkers out of the 100,000 members made the decision.

According to a statement issued following the conference, the Gaston organization was referred to Charles H. Gram, state labor commissioner, who is to serve in an advisory capacity for the executive. Smith pointed out that since the woodworkers joined the C. I. O., the carpenters have refused to handle lumber produced in Tacoma mills operated by C. I. O. members and declared that the men feared a similar situation if the Gaston group affiliated with the Lewis union.

Small labor disputes have developed from time to time outside the Stimson organization since two years ago when county deputy sheriffs and state police finally drove a horde of pickets from the valley road and re-opened the mill. All of this time the employees of the mill have remained non-union until this spring when an individual union was set up which handled labor matters until the Glenwood local forced organization.

School Seeking Consolidation

When the pupils moved out of the Deerlick school district without warning last spring, leaving the teacher twiddling her thumbs with a contract and nothing to do, property owners in the district set their faces toward some sort of change.

This week O. B. Kraus, county school superintendent, announced a meeting of the boundary board August 9 to consider a consolidation of the Deerlick with the Scoggins district. Each district will vote in separate schools, and both districts must approve the consolidation, Kraus said.

Because the school board moved away with the pupils of the Deerlick school, Kraus will act as the election board.

If created, the new district will be known as the Scoggins district, with more than double the valuation. So far as is known, Kraus said this week, this is the first attempt at consolidation of school districts in Washington county.

Considerable interest is being shown at the poultry show this year by both club members and open class exhibitors, reports Francis, and it is anticipated that this year's fair will have one of the best poultry shows ever held in the county.

Finding Skeleton Brings Many Hopes

"There's a lot of misery in the world," remarked Fred J. Sewell, county coroner, this week as he shuffled letters written from various places by persons seeking loved ones counted among the missing.

All the letters are hopeful and all give descriptions, which might tally with the skeleton found recently in a canyon on Barnes road near the Multnomah county line. The bones still rest in a suit case in Sewell's possession, awaiting identification.

The most recent letter was from Mrs. Emma M. Oram of Springfield, who is seeking a husband who dropped from sight in 1931. She has a family she wrote to Sheriff John Connel.

Hours of work have been expended by the state police in checking clues but as yet nothing has been found more promising than the identification of the watch as a possession of a man named Charles Tillotson. The watch was a gold case, open face Hampden, repaired several times in Portland for Tillotson. When found the watch still was in an excellent state of repair, Sewell says.

County Funds Good Condition

Washington county completed the first six months of the year with \$114,098.69 on hand and total collections during the period of \$702,484.25. The year began with \$109,946.38 balance on hand.

Various funds show balances as follows at the end of the period: County road, \$1,664.98; county general, \$9,549.13; county schools, \$13,706.05; district high schools, \$19,641.56; union high schools, \$42,112.77; non-high school, \$32,124.08.

Since the treasurer's report, \$34,425 from state auto license funds has been received, enabling the treasurer to call road warrants to May 6, 1937.

Tax collections for the six months amounted to \$863,322.81.

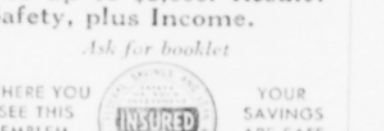

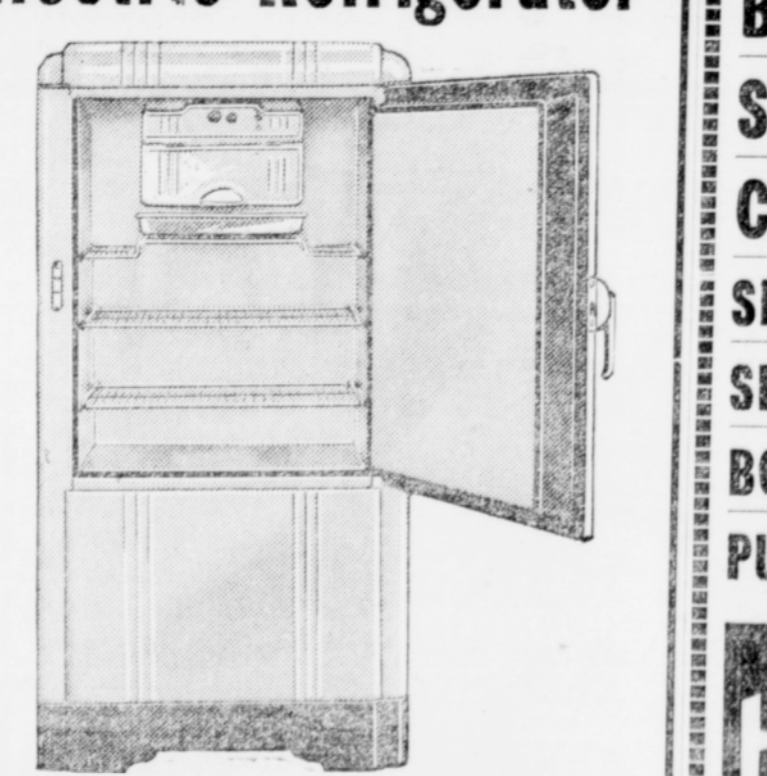
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
