## Allen Herd of Jerseys Leads County Testing Association

With 819 cows on test in the Washington County Testing association during June, total average was 670 pounds of milk and 30.28 pounds of fat per cow. There were 252 cows which produced more than 40 pounds of fat each, and 30 herds were on test.

High producing herd for the month was owned by L. R. Allen, with 11 grade Jerseys producing an average of 660 pounds of milk, and 44.87 pounds of fat. The high producing cow was Hunky No. 2, grade Jersey owned by David Haag & Sons, which produced 1905 pounds of milk and 89.9 pounds of fat.

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


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
